

Two Types of CO Poisoning



ACUTE CO POISONING



Detectable with a blood test


Treatable with hyperbaric oxygen

CHRONIC CO POISONING

Multiple exposures to low levels

Poorly recognized & no diagnostics

No treatment





Founder's Story



11 Years of CO Poisoning

- Multiple misdiagnoses
- Dozens of Prescriptions
- No Treatment Plan



... Until CO leaks discovered in 2013

- 1. Furnace #1: Crack in furnace flue
- 2. Furnace #2 and HWH #1 and HWH #2: Vented thru a single 4" flue
- 3. Chimney: Built below roofline
- 4. Gas Dryer: Internal leak



Gap 1: Alarms Not Intuitive

DO YOU KNOW HOW MANY BEEPS?

- CO detected?
- Smoke detected?
- Battery low?

> 50% of Fire Service Didn't Recognize CO Alarm



Gap 2: Training & PPE

Silent & Deadly Job Hazard



More training needed for all responders:



Firefighters, police, EMTs, HVAC installers, plumbers





 Firefighters killed & injured by CO while in overhaul, fire suppression, surf rescue, wildland fire operations, confined space operations, & live fire training.¹



 Negative health effects seen by workers include with cardiovascular disease, mental health issues, cancer, etc.



Gap 3: Alarms Warn Too Late




Why 10x the WHO Guidelines?

- 1) Alarms are designed to ignore CO under 70 ppm
- 2) CPSC warns consumers, "CO Alarms are Life Safety devices" & further warn they "DO NOT prevent injury"

Gap 4: Surveillance Data

NO NATIONAL SURVEILLANCE SYSTEM

- · CDC
 - Estimate deaths & hospitalizations using surveillance activities not primarily designed for CO poisoning
- National Fire Incident Reporting System (NFIRS)
 - Voluntary used be 75% of FDs
 - Reports incidents not individuals
- OSHA: Limited investigated incidences
- EDs: Reports symptoms, not individual diagnoses
- Poison Control



Gap 5: Insufficient Diagnostics

STEP 1: Access Symptoms

CO is the "Great Mimicker"



- Hangover, flu, food poisoning, stress
- Anxiety, depression, emotional issues
- Stroke, cardiac or high blood pressure
- Brain fog, dementia, Parkinson's, Alzheimer's

STEP 2: Blood Tests

COHb test is problematic



- Invasive, <u>arterial</u> blood draw
- Half-life = 4 hrs. (1 hr. with oxygen)
- Only at ~ 65% of labs
- No test for chronic poisoning

Gap 6: Treatment

OXYGEN THERAPY IS NOT ENOUGH

Hyperbaric (HBOT) *Pressurized Oxygen*



Supplemental Eases heart & lung workload

Issues:

- Oxygen removes CO from blood but, pushes it deeper into muscle & tissue
- Risk of brain damage (DNS) ~2x after HBOT
- HBOT may damage weakened cardiac tissue
- Doesn't address damage to brain, thyroid, cardiac tissue, nerve endings, etc.

OXYGEN ALONE IS INEFFECTIVE




