
### History of the Grant Program

- Established by the Nicholas and Zachary Burt Memorial Carbon Monoxide Poisoning Prevention Act
- Longtime advocacy effort by many fire and emergency services organizations
- Bill was sponsored by Senators Klobuchar and Hoeven, and Reps Buddy Carter and Kuster.
- President Biden signed the bill into law on March 15, 2022.
- Received \$2M in funding from FY23 & FY24 appropriations



### Requirements

- Eligibility: "Grant applicants must be from a state, local government, Indian Tribe or U. S. Territory that has adopted a statute, rule, regulation or similar measure that requires compliant carbon monoxide alarms to be installed in dwelling units in accordance with National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) 72, the International Fire Code (IFC), or the International Residential Code (IRC)."

- Purchase and install compliant carbon monoxide alarms
- Training materials and instructions
- Public education activities
